On behalf of myself and the rest of the festival team – Chris Beauchamp, Laura Beauchamp, Sarah Harwood, Gail Littleton, Mark Shpur, Abby Stanley-Melia, Adrian Tanasichuk, Kelly Thomas, and Dave Watson – we are thrilled to bring you 102 films from 22 countries: Canada, Afghanistan, Australia, Austria, Belgium, China, France, Germany, Iceland, India, Iran, Ireland, Israel, Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Poland, South Africa, Spain, Switzerland, UK, and the US. More than a third of these films are world, North American, Canadian, or Alberta premieres, and many of them are award-winning.

Editing is seldom an understood art form. Often it's regarded as a mechanical assembly of shots, only considered once principal photography has wrapped. In *Editing for Filmmakers*, attendees will delve into the artistic and emotional concepts that go into the final writing stage of making a movie. By analyzing award-winning films and exploring the storytelling tools afforded the editor, they will discuss how filmmakers can best prepare themselves during pre-production, whilst filming, and once in post.

(The only requisites for attending are a love for filmmaking and a desire to better understand the artistic world of editing.)

Screenwriting Competition

The deadline for the first Reel Shorts Screenwriting Competition is noon on April 29. Peace Region filmmakers who submit a screenplay of no more than 20 pages have the chance to win a \$2,500 production package to make their short film. Applicants have to be 18 years of age or older, and can enter no more than one script.

Feature filmmaker and workshop presenter Gordie Haakstad will judge the competition and announce the winner at 8:30 pm on Saturday, May 4 at Second Street Theatre.

Meet instructor Gordie Haakstad

Gordie Haakstad recently directed his first feature film, *ABEL'S FIELD*, starring Kevin Sorbo and Samuel Davis. The film is being released by Sony Pictures Home Entertainment.

Gordie gained his directing background as a filmmaker specialized in cinematography and editing. He began his education at the University of Southern California's School of Cinema and Television where he graduated Magna Cum Laude from the prestigious Production Program.

Following school, Gordie interned under cinematographer Don Burgess (*FORREST GUMP*, *SPIDERMAN*, *CAST AWAY*) on the set of *TERMINATOR 3: RISE OF THE MACHINES*. He maintained his ties with academia by teaching both cinematography and editing at the New York Film Academy – as well as developing much of the curriculum for those two departments.

while helping to create a number of industrial, short, and feature-length projects. Notably, Gordie was the cinematographer behind the award-winning *11 MINUTES AGO*, a feature-length film that was shot entirely in one day.

Gordie was born in Grande Prairie but moved to the US with his family when he was very young. He lives in Los Angeles but has been back in Grande Prairie to visit relatives and to write two feature screenplays. He will teach the Editing for Filmmakers – Exploring the Final Rewrite workshop on Sat, May 4. He will also judge the Screenwriting Competition and announce the winner at 8:30 pm on Sat, May 4.

Youth Film Mentorship Project

The Youth Film Mentorship Project is an exciting new initiative of the festival that awards a production package of \$10,000 to an Alberta Peace Region production team of writer, director, producer, cinematographer, and editor between the ages of 13 and 25 as they develop, shoot, and edit their own short film in or near Grande Prairie while receiving mentorship from Scott Belyea, Scooter Corkle, and Mike Bourree. There is no cost to apply and no cost to the winning team. It was made possible with funding from the provincial government and the generous support of Encana, the Stanford Hotel, and the Willmore Wilderness Foundation. It builds on a progres-

sion of filmmaking training led by Scott Belyea that we've offered since the first festival in 2007.

The project was announced in early February and the deadline to submit a script of approximately 10 pages as well as a production plan was March 11. The winning team of Imogen Pohl (Writer/Producer), Chillton Alstad (Cinematographer), Mike Evans (Editor), and Nathan Fast (Director) was announced on March 18. They won with a comedic script about a high school student who tries many crazy and out-of-the-box strategies in an effort to retrieve the pencil that he accidentally drops but desperately

needs in order to complete an exam while being supervised by a zero-tolerance teacher.

Since then, this team of students from Grande Prairie Composite High School has been busy developing the script, refining their production plan, adding crew members, and casting actors. Training on the gear (the RED EPIC camera from FAVA in Edmonton and a package of grip and lighting gear from William F. White International) began on April 20.

With great support from their school which also served as the location of their film, principal photography for HB took place from 4:00 pm until late into the evening over the three days of April 22-24. Post-production must be finished by May 4 and the film will have its world premiere when it leads off the Best of the Fest film packages on May 5. The mentors who have worked with this team

Shoot for Reel



Director Scott Belyea has attended the Reel Shorts Film Festival every year since its inception in 2007. Not only has he been able to showcase his work in the festival, he's presented filmmaking workshops for young people every year. In 2009 he, along with Festival Director Terry Scerbak, developed a workshop called the *Youth Filmmaking Challenge* designed to demonstrate the art and craft of filmmaking over a two-day period to a group of interested students. Each group would go through the stages of production - concept, writing, casting, shooting and editing - and the kids would walk away with a short film to call their own.

Always wanting to expand the project into something greater, Scott and Terry dreamt up what would be

known as *Shoot for Reel*, a two-week intensive training and production exercise in which twelve hand-picked interns would learn the craft from industry professionals the old-fashioned way: by being on a film set.

So in the summer of 2012, they brought a film set to Grande Prairie.

Six film professionals from Vancouver with backgrounds in lighting, camera, sound and production came to Grande Prairie with all the experience it would take to turn a group of novices into filmmaking veterans. Truckloads of necessary equipment was shipped in and the group learned by being thrown into the fire... Two days to learn the gear, six days to shoot and two days to sample post-production editing.

With a combined cast and crew of

over sixty people, thousands of dollars in community donations, and a whole bunch of can-do attitudes, the project was a resounding success and there's even a film to show for it. The team came together to become a family on THE HORIZON PROJECT and have since kickstarted an independent film scene in the region that now includes PRIMAA (Peace Region Independent Media Arts Association) which is a filmmakers' cooperative, and a group on Facebook called the Grande Prairie Youth Film Club.



With the film bug firmly planted and an army of skilled filmmakers in place, the graduates of the program have gone on to create a handful of their own productions, two of which are screening in the festival this year - SOPHIA in the I See You film package, and HOUSE CALL in the Criminal Minds film package (with encore

screenings in the North Peace Encore film package).

We're happy to premiere THE HORIZON PROJECT in Reel Shorts 2013 in the Out of This World film package (with an encore screening in the North Peace Encore film package) and look forward to many more projects to come from the Peace Country!



Special Guest Phil Richards



Phil Richards studied at the Ontario College of Art, graduating with his AOCA in 1973. Since then, he has worked full-time as a visual artist.

Richards has exhibited commercially since 1969, with numerous one-man and group shows in Canada, the United States and Europe. Since 1981, the Mira Godard Gallery in Toronto has been his principal dealer. Richards works in a variety of genres including large-scale murals, figure paintings, landscapes, still life, and portraiture. He also works in a variety of media: acrylic, casein, watercolour, graphite and sculpted relief.

Over the course of his career, Richards has been featured in a number of documentaries, the first being a full-length NFB film, OFFTHE WALL,

by Derek May in 1980. Three films were completed in 2012 concerning the painting of the Diamond Jubilee portrait. The NFB film, THE PORTRAIT, is a short documentary by the Oscar-nominated director Hubert Davis which aired on CBC in January. This film will screen as part of the Artist Talk at the Art Gallery of Grande Prairie at 1:30 pm on Saturday, May 4.

Montreal-based filmmaker Ninon Laroche's full-length documentary, ELIZABETH II AND CANADA, A PORTRAIT, and her short documentary, A ROYAL COMMISSION, both feature Richards. A ROYAL COMMISSION will screen in the A Woman's Place film package at 6:30 pm, Thursday, May 2nd and 11:00 am, Sunday, May 5th. It won Best Documentary at the 2013 Canada International Film Festival in Vancouver.

Phil Richards will lecture in depth on the process he employed when creating the Queen's portrait, and he will perform an extended demonstration of his drawing method. Audience members will be welcome to participate in the drawing lesson in their sketchbooks or to simply observe as they please. This is a rare opportunity to learn the working methods of one of Canada's premier painters.

Filmmakers in attendance

Scott Belyea

(Vancouver, grew up in Grande Prairie)



Scott has completed seven short films as writer, director and editor. His 2006 film, IDAHO, won various cinematography awards as well as Best English Language Film of the Year at the 2006 Young Cuts festival in Montreal.

His horror shorts SOYLENT RED and AFTERBIRTH garnered acclaim for their distinct visual style from filmmaker Robert Rodriguez, who called SOYLENT RED “genuinely disturbing.” It won the Audience Choice award in the 2007 Bloodshots Film-making Challenge. In 2009, his film TEN MINUTES BEFORE SHOWTIME won the festival’s Best Film award.

In 2009, he teamed with Domogeneous to create NOMANSLAND, a surreal tale of love lost that enjoyed a successful festival run including a Best Film win in Philadelphia and a stop in the Mediterranean for Spain’s illustrious *Sitges Festival of the Fantastic*.

In 2010, he was the Editor and Post-Production Supervisor for Reel One’s DEAR MR. GACY starring William Forsythe.

In 2011, his film CHILDREN OF THE

DARK won the Bloodshots festival’s Audience Choice and Grand Prize awards. Judge and filmmaker Larry Fessenden called the short “confident and sharp” and warned “this is not the last we’ll see from Scott Belyea.” After a successful festival run, the film’s Canadian rights were secured by CBC and it will be globally represented by Shorts International.

Scott was raised in Grande Prairie and moved to Vancouver to pursue a career in filmmaking. His films have screened in the festival every year since our first festival in 2007 and every year he has led very popular filmmaking workshops for youth. Last summer he and five other professionals from Vancouver trained a dozen interns during the two-week Shoot for Reel project which involved working on a real film, THE HORIZON PROJECT that Scott directed. For the 2013 festival, he is (1) mentoring the production team that won the Youth Film Mentorship Project, (2) participating in a Q&A after the screening of THE HORIZON PROJECT in the Out of This World film package and North Peace Encore film package, (3) participating as an actor in a Q&A after the screening of ADJUST TRACKING in the Psycho Shorts package, (4) and visiting junior high and high school classes with Producer Dave Rice during which they’ll screen THE HORIZON PROJECT and participate in a discussion afterwards.

Michael Bourree

(Grande Prairie)



Michael Bourree graduated from the two-year Interactive Digital Design program at Grande Prairie Regional College in 2010. He is the owner/manager of Ground Up Audio Video Production which produces corporate orientation and safety videos for an oilfield services company.

He also produces music videos and records, mixes, and masters albums for local bands.

Michael has been a leader of the Youth Filmmaking Challenge workshops since the first one at the 2009 Reel Shorts Film Festival. Those workshops have been replaced with the Youth Film Mentorship Project and Michael is one of the mentors. He is Co-Producer of THE HORIZON PROJECT, the film shot last summer during Shoot for Reel, the two-week internship program. It screens in the Out of This World film package and in the North Peace Encore film package.

Scouter Corkle

(Vancouver)



Scouter graduated from the two-year digital Film and Independent Filmmaker program at the Arts Institute of Burnaby in May 2003 and has worked extensively in the Vancouver film industry, including as a gaffer on feature films and music videos, as a lamp operator on television series and features, and as director of photography on commercials, short films (including CHILDREN OF THE DARK), and corporate projects. He’s also directed commercials and short films, the most recent of which, CHLOE AND ATTIE, had a successful festival run and was a Reel Shorts Official Selection in 2010.

Scouter helped develop the Youth Filmmaking Challenge workshops that were first offered at the 2009 Reel Shorts Film Festival. Those workshops have been replaced with the Youth Film Mentorship Project and Scouter is one of the mentors. He is Director of Photography for THE HORIZON PROJECT, the film shot last summer during Shoot for Reel, the two-week internship program. It screens in the Out of This World film package and in the North Peace Encore film package.

Eva Colmers
(Edmonton)



Eva Colmers is an independent filmmaker in Edmonton who has written, directed and produced a dozen award-winning short films including THE WEIGHTLESS TRAVELLER, END OF THE ROPE, HAND SUM, BLINK! and NO PROBLEM. For the NFB she has written and directed THE ENEMY WITHIN, based on her Father's experience as a POW in Canada; and more recently, THE NFB ELDER PROJECT, an episodic story collection about seven different elderly people.

Eva's short films have been seen at

countless festivals all around the globe and received awards for social commentary and creative style. With a background in theatre, Eva has also created media installations and visual backgrounds for theatre, dance, and music performances.

Eva first read about so-called "granny dumping" in a newspaper article of the National Post and felt compelled to explore the topic in an artistically creative way. Directing the NFB documentary, THE ELDER PROJECT, had already made her aware of the complexity of the issue and some of the challenges faced by both the frail elderly and the burned-out caregivers. Her decision was to write a fictional story grounded in reality and to juxtapose the end of life against the beginning of life. GRANNY BABY screens in the I See You film package. She will participate in a Q&A afterwards.

David Rice
(Vancouver)



David Rice is a lead producer/editor at Finale Editworks Post Production, Vancouver's leading independent post production facility in British Columbia. Since 2004, Dave has moved up the ranks in every aspect of post and has worked on projects ranging from shorts, TV series, commercials and feature films.

Dave recently produced two post-production heavy short films, CHIL-

DREN OF THE DARK and THE HORIZON PROJECT. CHILDREN OF THE DARK won best short film at Bloodshots Film Festival and went on to screen at the CFC Worldwide Short Film Festival and Toronto After Dark. THE HORIZON PROJECT is one of the largest undertakings for a short film in British Columbia, with a budget, visual effects treatment and sound design to rival some independent feature films. It will have its world premiere in the Out of This World film package and will also screen in the North Peace Encore film package. Dave will be visiting junior high and high school classes with Director Scott Belyea during which they'll screen the film and participate in a discussion afterwards.

Devon Burbank
(Grande Prairie)



Devon Burbank is a Grade 12 student at St. Joseph Catholic High School. She started stage acting in school at the age of 13 when she played The Cowardly Lion in *The Wizard of Oz*. Acting was never a large interest of hers until she was in the Grande Prairie Live Theatre production of *The Twelfth Night* when she was 16. She had three small roles in the play, two of them being male (with intense facial hair), which is when her creative side burst out and introduced her to the art of theatrical makeup. She has acted in many stage productions including *Mad Moose Mayhem* in 2012, and has been a part of the makeup backstage team with *Cats* in 2013.

She was introduced to films in THE HORIZON PROJECT directed by Scott Belyea. She acted as a survivor and was responsible for costume management along with Elise Schermerhorn. Devon became one of the founding five members of the Grande Prairie Youth Film Club. HOUSE CALL, the short film she wrote, directed, and produced, was the first film produced by the GPYFC.

Devon also was involved with another local film, SOPHIA, directed by Rory Mellis. She played the Pig Lady, created the makeup and supplied the props, and helped out as much as possible with the effects and grip work.

HOUSE CALL will screen in the Criminal Minds film package at 8:30 pm on Saturday, May 4. Devon will do a Q&A afterwards.

Rio's award-winning film THE DRIVING ACCIDENT has screened at many film festivals around the world including the 2011 Chicago International Children's Film Festival which is widely recognized as the major festival of films and videos for children in North America.

Rio's fifth short film, FOUND A PEANUT, is based on the old camp song of the same name. If you have heard the tune, you may have wondered why someone

THE TRAP is Rio's sixth short film and stars his eight-year-old daughter Billie who was seven at the time the film was made. This is the fourth year in a row that Rio has had a film in the festival. It screens in the Flights of Imagination film package. Rio and Billie will participate in a Q&A after the screening.

As a resident of Grande Cache, Susan has authored three books about the people and peaks of the Canadian Rockies. She is the Executive Director of the Willmore Wilderness Foundation / People & Peaks Productions and is currently mentoring four film students who are on work experience. A NOTE ON RATINGS:

In the past, Alberta Film Classification (AFC) allowed film festivals, including our own, to rate films according to the AFC classification system of G, PG, 14A, 18A and R. This is no longer the case, so for unrated films we have adopted our own rating system based on age: 5+, 10+, 14+, and 18+. When AFC has rated a film, we must show their rating rather than our own, so you will see a mixture of AFC ratings and our ratings throughout this program. The teachers on our festival team—Kelly Thomas, Adrian Tanasichuk, and Dave Watson—have determined which films are appropriate for Elementary, Junior High, and High School classes.
